Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999: Not listed

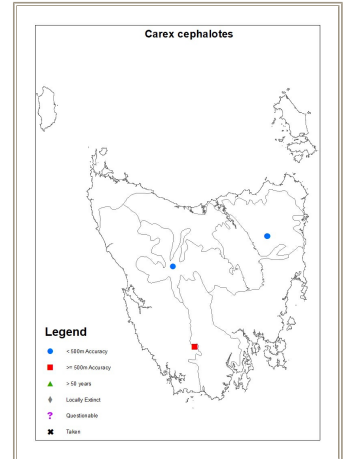
Endemic Status: Found in Tasmania and elsewhere

- This densely tufted, perennial sedge has only been recorded once in Tasmania on 20/1/1982. Flowering occurs in summer (Flora of Victoria). Mature inflorescences are required for identification.
- In Tasmania, *Carex cephalotes* is known only from a snow patch on the lee side of Mount Eliza in the western mountains at an altitude of 1250 metres.

Permit: A permit is required under the Tasmanian *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995* to 'take' (which includes kill, injure, catch, damage, destroy and collect), keep, trade in or process any specimen or products of a listed species. Additional permits may also be required under other Acts or regulations to take, disturb or interfere with any form of wildlife or its products, (e.g. dens, nests, bones). This may also depend on the tenure of the land and other agreements relating to its management.
