Status: *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995:* rare

Endemic: Found only in Tasmania

This species was known as *Brachyglottis brunonis*.

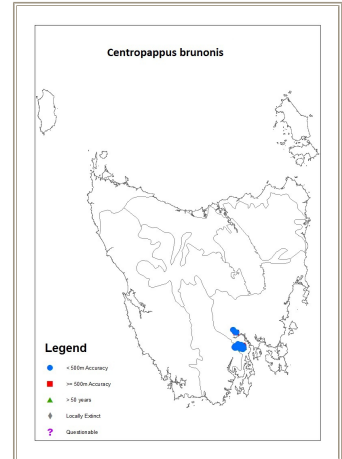

- Flowering of this small tree or large shrub is from December to February. Most herbarium specimens have been collected from December to January. Flowers are needed to confirm the identification of the genus/species.
- Centropappus brunonis* occurs amongst boulders and talus in sub-alpine vegetation at altitudes of up to 900 metres.

Permit: A permit is required under the Tasmanian *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995* to 'take' (which includes kill, injure, catch, damage, destroy and collect), keep, trade in or process any specimen or products of a listed species. Additional permits may also be required under other Acts or regulations to take, disturb or interfere with any form of wildlife or its products, (e.g. dens, nests, bones). This may also depend on the tenure of the land and other agreements relating to its management.
