

- While this widely spreading, strong-smelling shrub can be identified from its foliage, the presence of flowers can greatly
 facilitate detection. Flowering is from November to February (Flora of Victoria), with the only Tasmanian specimens collected
 in the 1880s, in October, December and February.
- On the mainland this species occurs in the alpine and subalpine heaths of Victoria and New South Wales. Apart from planted specimens, this species appears to be extinct in Tasmania.

Permit: A permit is required under the Tasmanian *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995* to 'take' (which includes kill, injure, catch, damage, destroy and collect), keep, trade in or process any specimen or products of a listed species. Additional permits may also be required under other Acts or regulations to take, disturb or interfere with any form of wildlife or its products, (e.g. dens, nests, bones). This may also depend on the tenure of the land and other agreements relating to its management.
