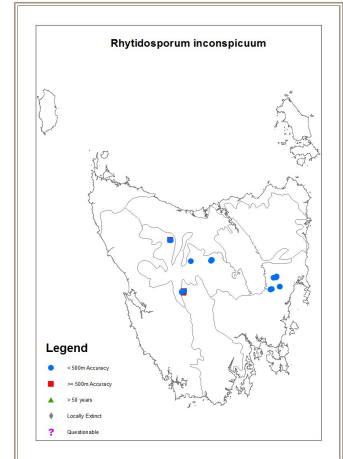

- This prostrate and spreading undershrub is difficult to find, but is most easily detected and identified when flowering and fruiting in late November to December and January to early February respectively, in montane areas. Most observations from lower altitudes have been made from late October to early December.
- In Tasmania, *Rhytidosporum inconspicuum* occurs in grassy heath at several montane sites in the Central Highlands and in wetter, grassy, sedgy or heathy areas, sometimes in eucalypt woodland, at lower altitudes in the Eastern Tiers and south west of Bicheno. Plants have been recorded from 10 to 1240 metres above sea level.

Permit: A permit is required under the Tasmanian *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995* to 'take' (which includes kill, injure, catch, damage, destroy and collect), keep, trade in or process any specimen or products of a listed species. Additional permits may also be required under other Acts or regulations to take, disturb or interfere with any form of wildlife or its products, (e.g. dens, nests, bones). This may also depend on the tenure of the land and other agreements relating to its management.
