Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999: Critically Endangered

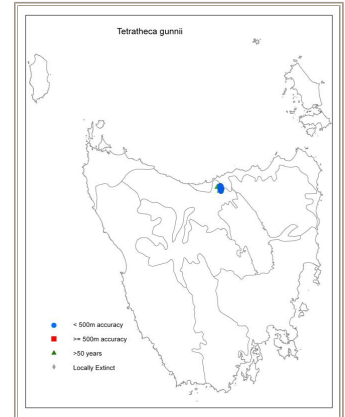
Endemic Status: Found only in Tasmania

- Flowers are required to confirm the identification of this straggling perennial herb, with detection very difficult in their absence. Flowering occurs from late September to early December, peaking in late October and early November.
- Tetratheca gunnii* is restricted to serpentine outcrops in the foothills of the Dazzler Range near Beaconsfield, where it occurs in relatively open areas dominated by black peppermint (*Eucalyptus amygdalina*) and black gum (*Eucalyptus ovata*) over a heathy understorey, or in *Allocasuarina littoralis* woodland with a sparse understorey. Some sites are associated with disturbance induced openness from mining and wood harvesting activities.

Permit: A permit is required under the Tasmanian *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995* to 'take' (which includes kill, injure, catch, damage, destroy and collect), keep, trade in or process any specimen or products of a listed species. Additional permits may also be required under other Acts or regulations to take, disturb or interfere with any form of wildlife or its products, (e.g. dens, nests, bones). This may also depend on the tenure of the land and other agreements relating to its management.
