Thynninorchis nothofagicola myrtle elbow orchid

Group: Magnoliophyta (flowering plants), Liliopsida (monocots), Orchidales, Orchidaceae

Status: *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995*: **endangered**
Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999: Critically Endangered

Endemic Status: Found only in Tasmania



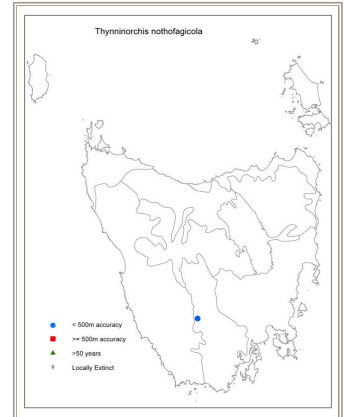

- Flowers are required for the identification and to aid detection of this ground orchid which dies back to subterranean tubers after flowering. The few observations of this species have been made in February. The plants are difficult to spot in the gloomy light conditions of its habitat.
- *Thynninorchis nothofagicola* is restricted to one small site in the southwest of the State where it occurs in leaf litter in tall open *Eucalyptus delegatensis* forest with a rainforest understorey of *Nothofagus cunninghamii*, *Atherosperma moschatum* and *Dicksonia antarctica*.

Permit: A permit is required under the Tasmanian *Threatened Species Protection Act 1995* to 'take' (which includes kill, injure, catch, damage, destroy and collect), keep, trade in or process any specimen or products of a listed species. Additional permits may also be required under other Acts or regulations to take, disturb or interfere with any form of wildlife or its products, (e.g. dens, nests, bones). This may also depend on the tenure of the land and other agreements relating to its management.
